#### Wild World: Polar Bear

As their name implies, the only place polar bears roam free is the Arctic. Adult males can weigh more than 1,000 pounds and measure up to 8 feet from head to tail, making them the largest land carnivores in the world. These powerful predators mostly hunt seals, and occasionally walruses and small whales. Their thick white fur provides excellent camouflage among snow and ice as they wait for prey to surface from the sea. Underneath their heavy coat, polar bears' skin is black, which helps them retain more heat from the sun.

#### **Sock Snowman**

This soft snowman will look cute sitting on a shelf or table.

#### **Materials:**

- Measuring cup
- Two socks, one white and one any color (ankle or crew-type socks)
- Dry rice or beans
- Rubber bands
- Scissors
- Hot glue gun and glue
- Buttons and/or pompoms, various colors
- Black marker
- Ribbon

#### **Directions:**

Use the measuring cup to fill the white sock with dry rice or beans to create your desired size of snowman. Wind a rubber band around the top of the sock to close the opening, then trim any excess fabric. Take another rubber band and place it around the sock, about a third of the way down, to form the snowman's head and body.

Glue several buttons or pompoms down the front of the snowman's body, and dot on eyes and a mouth with the black marker. For the nose, glue on a small orange pompom or button. Wrap a length of ribbon around the snowman's neck to resemble a scarf, and secure with glue.

To make a hat, cut the colored sock just below the heel. With the toe section as the top of the hat, place the sock on the snowman's head and roll up the cut end to form the hat's brim.

#### **Winter Blooms**



### Winter Solstice Around the World

Winter officially arrives on Dec. 21, when the Northern Hemisphere will experience the shortest period of daylight of the year. The long, dark night that follows holds significance for many cultures. Warm up with this peek at some winter solstice traditions around the world.

Dongzhi Festival. In China, families gather to welcome the return of longer days by eating warm, comforting foods. Dumplings with various fillings are the custom, as are tangyuan, brightly colored rice balls that are said to represent the family unit because of their round shape.

Soyal Ceremony. The Hopi people of Arizona spend 16 days celebrating the winter solstice, with several rituals performed in underground chambers called *kivas*. Kachina dancers, who represent spiritual messengers, lead the festivities, which culminate in an all-night ceremony of feasting, dancing and gift-giving.

*Toji*. Observed in Japan, this celebration involves a bath with *yuzu*, a citrus fruit that resembles a lemon, to prevent colds.

#### **Over the Road Snacking**

Forget about roadside attractions—these must-see spectacles are on the actual road. Check your blind spot for these fan favorite foodmobiles.

The Big Idaho Potato Truck. Travelers should keep their eyes peeled for this 4-ton potato replica. If the towering tater were real, it would have taken more than 7,000 years to grow and would make almost 1 million french fries. The gigantic spud travels in style on a red tractor trailer with the Tater Team.

The NUTmobile. Americans have been snacking on Planters nuts for more than 100 years. In 1935, an ambitious Planters salesman built a peanut car. Since then, the nutty vehicle has been reinvented as a NASCAR hot rod, a biodiesel vehicle and a camper.

The Oscar Mayer Wienermobile. The iconic hot dog on wheels has been hitting the pavement since the 1930s. The Wienermobile has lived through many retirements and rebirths, including being reinvented as a mini Wienermobile, an off-road vehicle and a Wienie-Bago, where a few lucky football fans found lodging at the 50th Super Bowl. A tour crew, named the Hotdoggers, mans today's Wienermobile.

## "This Month In History"

#### **DECEMBER**

1907: On New Year's Eve, a ball decorated with 100 lightbulbs is lowered down a flagpole over New York City's Times Square. The ball drop has been featured in the annual celebration ever since.

1918: In the first official visit by a U.S. president to Europe, Woodrow Wilson travels to France for World War I peace negotiations.

1924: Astronomer Edwin Hubble announces his discovery of the existence of galaxies outside the Milky Way. The Hubble Space Telescope was named in his honor.

**1941:** America enters World War II after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Hawaii.

**1966:** The first observance of Kwanzaa takes place in Los Angeles. The seven-day holiday celebrates African heritage.

**1970:** Congress authorizes the creation of a new dollar coin depicting President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

**1982:** Gabriel Garcia Marquez is awarded the Nobel Prize in

literature. The Colombian writer is best known for his 1967 novel "One Hundred Years of Solitude."

**1990:** British computer scientist Tim Berners-Lee demonstrates his information-sharing system that would become the World Wide Web.

**2001:** Italy's Leaning Tower of Pisa reopens to the public after 11 years and \$27 million in work to fortify its famous lean.

**2017:** "Star Wars: The Last Jedi," the eighth installment in the space fantasy series, premieres. The film's \$1 billion in ticket sales made it the year's highest-grossing film.
